Dick Keller designer of the Blueflame rocket LSR car which set the WLSR at 622 MPH in 1970, has been an inspiration to our project. In last month's newsletter we asked for assistance in selecting a suitable wheel bearing for our 1000 MPH mission, Dick came straight back to me as he has done many times in the past with the help we needed, a really special guy, he should be a US Senator.

We are soon to invert Aussie Invader and commence sheeting the "V" underside of our car. Hopefully this inverted position will never be seen again, especially with me in it! The car will be upside down for approximately two months and as always Murphy's Law will apply and some media event will require her to be right side up, and that will be a hassle, so let's see.



Steve Sugden has been busy designing and building our special windshield canopy hinges, boy this has consumed some valuable time but we now believe we have the problem solved.

Our canopy has to move 100mm rearward before tilting upward. Hinged from the front, we could not find a thing anywhere that would allow us to do this, so in normal Land Speed tradition, we had to design and build it ourselves.

Great work Steve.

Our chute anchor has been designed, built and fitted. After calculating the load requirements to deploy a stabilizing chute at 600 MPH we decided to err on the side of caution and go with a 19mm thick chute tongue rather than the lighter 15mm one. Nothing worse than firing a chute and the back of the car ripping off, its happened to me on many occasions, and the thought that races through your head is always, "wish I had beefed up that chute mount" as you hurtle into the unknown.



Rocket Lab in New Zealand has again put in a huge effort to see us in the winner's circle. These guys are in a league of their own with the rocket knowledge and expertise they share with us.
